The Priesthood

During Old Testament times, there were priests that served as mediators between God and man presenting their prayers and sacrifices to Him. Before Moses, the priests' duties were often done by the head of a household as Job. Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob. During Moses' day, God appointed priests from the Levite lineage. and this practice was intended to continue until the perfect priest came, Jesus Christ

The Old Testament priests were not perfect. Their limitations were because:

- ordained **∞** Thev were ("appointed by") by men, although they were of an ancestry ordered by God (Hebrews 5:1).
- They had to go to God with sacrifices and gifts (Heb. 5:1, 3). The offerings were not a one-time gift. They were only temporary appeasements to a Holy God.
- The priests themselves were sinners. They also had to give an offering themselves (Heb. 5:2, 3).
- Soon the priesthood stopped. sacrifices The halted. Intercessory prayers and gifts

to God ceased, but man was still in desperate need of a mediator between him and God.

Solution God then sent man the perfect priest. He was not appointed by man. He only had to make one offering for all of man's sins. That sacrifice covered sins past, present, and even into the future. This priest was not of Levi's lineage. He was very much like a priest of Abraham's time Melchisedec. Like Melchisedec, whose name means "king of righteousness", this God-appointed priest was the real King of righteousness. This priest was the only Godappointed priest. This priest was God's only begotten Son — Jesus! Jesus' one-time sacrifice, that never had to be re-offered, was His own life.

Unfortunately, many have not allowed God's High priest to be the sacrifice for their sins. Too many have rejected Jesus and are still appointing their own priests. No matter what those sincere people offer to God, it will be refused by the Creator. They are doing it their way and are refusing the one-time sacrifice Jesus made for them on Calvary's cross.

There are many more than ten commandments; some say 603; some say 613. The complete Old Testament Law includes commandments on accidental deaths, fighting, crime, diseases, slavery, punishment, marriage restrictions, tolerances, dietary, dress, witchcraft, injuries, sexual restraints, and other categories.

Continued from Page 1 many what was right and wrong (Galatians 3:24). Even today, with few even attending church or reading their Bible, the law has still done its work in many hearts. It still convicts many to know what is right, and what is not.

When Christianity started spreading, its message was different to what many of the religious had heard previously. Instead of the strict enforcement of the Old Testament Law, its message had all to do with

"faith". They had to believe something that was not written down at the time, was talked negatively about in their temples, and could not be seen or proven. It was an "invisible" trust on their part.

Faith was an old concept, but many never realized it was part of the Old Testament lives. When it was emphasized in the early church teachings, there were some questions and doubts. The Jews did not quite realize that much of what Abraham (Gal. 3:9), Moses, and other Old Testament figures did was done by faith on their part. Those saints had to step out and follow God when there was no evident direction or sign. Their faith that the Almighty would deliver or help them was what allowed them to get closer to God and to be used by Him.

Now the early Christians had to step out and trust what Jesus said and commanded them to do. They had to believe that His words were also God's commandments. With the pull of what they used to do for hundreds of years, by sight and obedience to the law, they now had to understand that it was more important for them to trust Jesus' finished work on the cross (Gal. 3:26).

I imagine their feelings were much like the feelings of one saved from an unbiblical religion today. People may be used to lighting candles, reciting prayers, telling their sins to a man in a confessional, and following other teachings of their church. However, after they got saved, they realized that those practices were not scriptural, and that they were not to do them anymore. They had to step out, by faith and believe Jesus' words and trust Him, and forget what they had done in the past.

Faith can be difficult for some to let lead them. Laws seem easier and more secure for many to follow. That is why so many try to hang on to both sides. They try to follow the laws they also learned previously, and also try to live by faith. It cannot be both. Trusting in something other than faith is not faith (Gal. 2:12). We can only be justified ("pardoned or cleared of sin's guilt") by faith in Jesus Christ (Gal. 3:27).

The Priesthood

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The Old Testament priesthood was for another time — a time before the perfect Priest had been sent by God. Today we have the privilege of going to that High Priest, who is not sitting in some earthly temple or church, but is sitting at the right hand of the Father in Heaven. We can accept His offering on the cross to cover all our sins. After we have accepted Him as our Saviour, we can go to Him anytime with our prayers and needs. We no longer need an imperfect middle man. We have the perfect mediator — Christ Jesus
