

"And when his disciples James and John saw this, they said, Lord, wilt thou that we command fire to come down from heaven, and consume them, even as Elias did? 55 But he [Jesus] turned, and rebuked them, and said, Ye know not what manner of spirit ve are of." Luke 9:54-55

Reading in Luke 9:55 should make us aware that there are different "spirits" in this world; and they are not all of God. Although James and John thought they were doing the right thing by protecting Jesus, Jesus told them

that the spirit controlling their actions and attitudes was not of God. Christ similarly discerned that one time Peter was letting the wrong spirit direct his thinking (Matthew 16:23).

A little knowledge of the different spirits described in the Bible can help us know, when

dealing with people, if what we are dealing with is from God or from satanic influences.

There are three sources of "spirits" in this world. The most commonly addressed spirit in the Bible is man's own nature and character. Hundreds of times this spirit is talked about, as was the spirit of Jacob (Gen. 45:27), Elijah (II Kings. 2:15), and other people of the Bible.

Secondly, there is a spirit clearly of God. Sometimes it is referred as "Spirit", with capital letters, because it is a proper noun. It is God. Other names for His spirit include: spirit of God, Holy Spirit, and Spirit of the Lord. This spirit from God can also work in a person's life. These spirits can be recognized when a person is giving godly wisdom (Deut. 34:9, Eph. 1:17). These may include: a contrite spirit (Ps. 34:18), a broken spirit (Ps. 51:17), an excellent spirit (Dan. 5:2) a spirit of grace (Zech. 12:10), a faithful spirit (II Cor. 4:13), an ability to do the impossible (Jud. 14:6, 19), spirit of truth (John 14:17, 15:26), and a spirit of meekness (I Cor. 4:21, Gal. 6:1).

There are dangerous, demonic spirits that we also have to be wary and cautious of. This is why Ephesians 6:23 warns of an unseen, invisible battle that is part of our everyday lives: "For we wrestle not against flesh and blood, but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of the darkness of this world, against spiritual wickedness in high places."

Some of the spirits that are not of God but are of satanic

origin include spirits of:

- Denying Christ (I John 4:3)
- Bestructiveness (Mark 9:20)
- Disobedience (Eph. 2:2)
- Divination ("Attempting to foretell the future" Acts 16:16)
- Evilness (Judge 9:23)
- Familiar spirit (what wizards and witches speak to)
- **Fear (Rom. 8:15, II Tim. 1:7)**
- Foulness (Mark 9:25)
- **3** Jealously (Num. 5:14, 30)
- **3** Judgment
- 💥 Lying
- 3 Not talking (Mark 9:17)
- **Perverseness**
- Troubled or vexed spirit (Ecc. 4:4)
- Wuncleanliness (Mark 1:23)
- Whoredoms (Hos. 5:4)

Knowing a little about these different types of spirits can help one discern the source of good or evil in their everyday life. This knowledge can help one know if the situation he is facing is of God, his flesh, or from a force that is against God. Proper decision-making based on considering where the influence is coming from can help one make fewer mistakes.

When an unholy spirit has any control in an unsaved man, it is not "cool". It is devastating. This story, found in Mark 5 and here in verses 22-39, tells us what these demonic spirits can do to a life. Here we see that they:

- Can be multiple demons (vs. 27).
- Can make one's life miserable for a long time (vs. 27).
- Can influence a person to be immodest (vs. 27).
- Can inhibit a person from being socially acceptable (vs. 27). This man could not live in a house like normal people.
- May encourage a person to be infatuated with death (vs. 27). This man lived in tombs.
- May make a person tormented by these spirits (vs. 28).
- Will make a person live an unclean life and commit "dirty" things, and have a filthy lifestyle (vs. 29).
- Will take away one's freedom (vs. 29). This man had to be bound by chains. He was so socialy unacceptable and had abnormal behavior, others tried to lock him up.
- May give a person supernatural, destructive strength (vs. 29).
- Control the person (vs. 29) and can give one a lonely life.

Although this account and the one in Mark does not tell why this man was inhabited by these destructive forces, other Scriptures indicate that intentional exposure to sin can allow these "devils" to control a life of an unsaved person. No matter what level of control these demonic powers are allowed to have in a life, there is good news. The good news is that Jesus can cleanse any life.

Here in this chapter, Jesus commanded the spirits to leave, and they did. The man was converted to a controlled, decent man (Luke 8:35), who had a new desire to live for the Lord. He was a changed man.

Some of these demonic traits can be seen in people in today's society. The "possession" occurrence is not as common as the fictional movie accounts portray it, but exposure to sin can rob any life of the joy and freedom it should have.

The only cure for a devastated, ruined life is salvation. When sin is forgiven, a new desire is born in a person to live for God and follow His commands. With this new direction, a life can be transformed, as was this man's. When Jesus comes into one's life, old ways can leave; if the person allows the Lord to lead in his life! There is always hope through Jesus!

"Therefore let us not sleep, as do others; but let us watch and be sober." I Thes. 5:6
