 Train children in the way they should go. Guidance and training are hard work, but they are the only ways they will learn the direction in which you want them to go. Hopefully, for a Christian parent, it will be the way God also wants them to go. Do not trust strangers to do that work for you.

"Train up a child in the way he should go: and when he is old, he will not depart from it."

- Correction is part of training.

- Taking the time to discipline children is showing love. Not disciplining children is not showing love.
