As they rolled on, the old veteran engineer shouted to his firemen, "Great heaven, I have run over two children."

Our ordinary views of prayer are not found in the New Testament. We look upon prayer as a means of getting things for ourselves. The Bible's idea of prayer is that we do have needs met, but prayer is the way we may get to know God Himself.

"Hitherto have ye asked nothing in my name: ask, and ye shall receive, that your joy may be full," (John 16:24) we read. We get apologetic or apathetic, but we ask very few things. Ask, and God will do. Give Jesus Christ a chance; give Him elbow room. No man will ever do this unless he is at his wits' end. When a man is at his wits' end it is not a cowardly thing to pray, it is the only way he can get into touch with Reality. Be yourself before God and present your problems,
