The Prayer Windmill

The owner of the hut causes certain prayers to be written by the priests, and then adheres them to the windmill's blades. They are then turned around by the wind, which saves him the trouble of repeating them himself.




Why Pray?

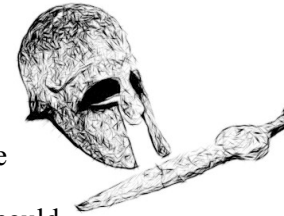
